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


#### **Roche Court**

Southampton Solent University



The Year 13 BTEC sport group went on a school trip to the Southampton Solent University.

Once we arrived, we were escorted to the room where we had an introduction about sport within the University, and how the day would run. The purpose of this trip was to give us an insight into the more technical and accurate equipment that is used within high level sport for fitness testing.

We used most of the equipment that the Southampton FC use. It was interesting to see how technical the equipment got, and how expensive some of this specialist equipment was. We used equipment including the Isokinetic Dynamometer, Vertical Jump Pressure Pads, Isometric Back Strength Test and the Bioelectric Impedance Analysis tests. Once we had completed the tests on the different components of fitness, we then compared results with each other. We were then given a tour of the rest of the sports facilities that they had to offer.



Overall the day gave us a great insight into Southampton Solent University, as well as University life, and also the different ways of testing the components of fitness.

As part of the trip they had the opportunity to engage in a sculpture workshop at the Barbara Hepworth Museum and Sculpture Garden and discuss her work and processes. All the students have been able to develop their projects and use this trip to inspire and motivate future work. The students have seen how landscape and art are combined and how figurative work can be transformed by its display and presentation.



In the evening the students entered into group discussions about their own perspectives on the artists work and how this has been challenged or changed by this trip. The trip was also a chance for the students to see how other artists have used similar starting points and the outcomes they have achieved and the processes they have used. They were superb ambassadors for the academy and really entered into the trip wholeheartedly to maximise its impact on their own work.


Awards were also presented to pupils who excelled in particular subjects and to those who were the highest achievers in their year group.

## Football U16 Town Cup

On Thursday 1st December the TBOWA Year 11 football team won the U12 Town Cup.

Having come second to an outstanding Harewood team in our half of the league, we qualified for the semi finals. The Year 11's beat a very good Tywnham team 2-1 after extra time away (goals from Louis Bragginton and Oliver Whitlelaw). This set us up for a final against Highcliffe.

It was an exciting final with TBOWA going into the game on the back of some poor performances but right from the start they proved to be the better side. The team attacked with pace; however, it was not looking like our day as we squandered 3 really good chances and went in at half time 0 -1 down after some poor defending.

At half time the team remained balanced and accepted that not only had we beaten better sides but there was



more to come. The second half started and we were immediately in attack mode led by inspirational captain Louis Bragginton, his lieutenant Oliver Whitelaw with John Zdrava dominating the midfield. Two goals from Louis put us 2-1 up; however, we were creating and missing clear chances. With about 5 minutes to go, Highcliffe equalised with an excellent goal.

The extra time team talk was based on the belief that this would be our day and we were not leaving Chapel Gate without the shield. Extra time saw both teams breaking on the counter attack looking for a winner but the game ended all square which set up the tension of penalties.

Each team had 5 penalty kicks. Our first penalty was from the impressive Byron Parry who calmly walked up, put the ball down and converted his kick in a calculated manner. Louis Bragginton and then Joh Zdrava beat their nerves and converted their kicks. Highcliffe missed 2 kicks and this led to us needing to convert 1 of our last 2. Our fourth kick was missed but Lewis House slotted home the final penalty and was charged by his happy team mates.

The magnitude of this success is heightened by the fact that the last time we won the Year 11 trophy was 1963 and also the standard of teams at this age group is very high. To beat Winton, Bournemouth School, Bourne Academy, Twynham and Highcliffe in the final is a major accomplishment.

This victory was down to 3 years of hard work, a team mentality of unity and never giving up with developing self belief. A thank you from the team to Mr Palmer whose support was appreciated. Also to assistant coach Joshua Holes who having been injured for the season was a huge help in assisting me with the team. Also thank you to Mr Hirdle (father of Joel) and Mr Zdrava (father of John) for their support in very cold and dark conditions.

TBOWA scarves are available to purchase via ParentPay for £9.90.


The scarves are in Academy colours and are a great addition to our uniform during the cold winter months.

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At TBOWA, it is within our duty of care for our students to ensure that we inform parents and carers of the following:

- How pupils use ICT in school
- How using ICT at home helps students learn
- How the internet can be used safely a home
- Where to find out more information of how to be safe online

# How you child uses ICT at TBOWA

ICT is taught as an individual subject, but also used in several lessons across our curriculum. Within lessons, pupils use a wide range of ICT including:

- •Word processing (Word) to write essays, news articles or letters
- •Databases (Access) to record information
- Spreadsheets (Excel) to create tables, charts and graphs
- •Desktop Publishing (Publisher) to design posters, leaflets and cards

•Multimedia Presentation (Powerpoint or Movie Maker) to present text, pictures and video

•Adobe Creative Cloud 2014 (After Effects, Audition, Bridge, Dreamweaver, Edge Animate, Fireworks, Flash Professional, Illustrator, InCopy, InDesign, Media Coder, Photoshop, Prelude, Premiere Pro and SpeedGrade)

- •Internet (Explorer and Chrome) to research for project work
- •Email (Outlook) to contact friends and email work to teachers
- •Video Conferencing (Skype) to share ideas or ask an expert

•Digital Cameras to record classwork, coursework or research from a trip

• Music Software to create compositions

Mobile devices including phones are not permitted at any time (even before or after school hours) on the Academy site. Phones can only be used once a pupil has exited the Academy site. Pupils and parents can communicate through Student Desk where pupils can make and receive calls/messages to/from parents regarding any issues.



We would recommend that you know all the passwords for your child's mobile phone and check this regularly.

How you can help your child at home

ICT not just about using a computer - it is the use of a mobile phone, digital camera, MP3 player or DVD player. Pupils can develop their ICT skills further at home by:

- Writing a letter or email to a relative
- · Creating digital artwork or pictures
- Using the internet to research a project
- Using recommended websites to enhance learning e.g. BBC Bitesize

# Benefits of using ICT at home

There are several advantages of having a computer and internet access at home. Some of these are:

- ICT can help pupils attainment
- Skills are developed for life
- Developing enjoyment of using ICT
- Able to access a wider range of learning materials
- Support homework and revision
- Improves presentation of their work

Whilst we encourage the use of ICT for pupils to learn and access a wide range of material, it is within our duty of care to advise parents and carers to carefully monitor your child's use of the internet. Despite many internet service providers offering filtering systems and tools to help safeguard your child, it is still surprisingly easy to access inappropriate material including text, pictures and films.

We would recommend that your computer is in a family area if possible and not in a bedroom. Also please remember that many mobile phones, games consoles and electronic readers do allow access to the internet.

Recommended rules for using the internet at home

• Use a pupil friendly search engine and websites that are recommended by teaching staff

- Only speak to people you actually know online
- Know how to report abuse and block those unwanted users
- Only use a webcam with people you know
- Report concerns to the Child Exploitation & Online Protection Centre (CEOP)
- · Be aware of comments that are being made and can be viewed by others
- Tell an adult that you trust IMMEDIATELY if you feel unsafe online

The are your top tips to keep us all safe on the internet:

• Don't add people you don't know on social networking sites. You wouldn't talk to a stranger in the street, so why talk to them online?

• Don't upload photographs of yourself that are inappropriate or give information away about yourself. You don't know how these images will be used by others!

• Don't give away your personal details on the internet. You don't know who can access this information
